

Appendix 1 – Land use categories 1951 and 2005

On page 1.6, planning land use zones have been used to compare Melbourne's land uses in 2005 to those identified in 1951 by a land use survey conducted for the 1954 Metropolitan Plan. For valid comparisons, only land within the 2005 Urban Growth Boundary (UGB) (and excluding rural-zoned land within the boundary) is included in calculations of areas devoted to main land uses. Some zones are combined into categories for ease of comparability (see table below). Green wedges are excluded as they are outside the UGB.

On page 1.6, the 1951 urban area excludes farmland surrounded by urban uses, therefore it may be understated when compared to other estimates of the urban area at that time.

Appendix 2 – ARCUE public open space database 2002

The Australian Research Centre for Urban Ecology (ARCUE) Open Space data set maps open space in Melbourne within an urban area as defined by ARCUE. It includes all 31 Metropolitan LGAs, but some outer LGAs are partly excluded, as ARCUE does not classify them entirely as urban. In this case, only the section of the LGA designated as urban is covered by the Open Space data set. The open space categories used by ARCUE have been separated by the Melbourne Atlas into public open space and other public land devoted to specific purposes. The Melbourne Atlas, on page 1.10, has only mapped public open space, as in the first column in the table below.
