## Standards for management - Weeds

Information Sheet No. 8

Under BushTender the following minimum standards apply for weed control. The BushTender Field Officer will discuss the various weed control options with you.

- You are required to comply with requirements to control or eradicate weeds listed under the *Catchment and Land Protection Act 1994*. For more information visit [www.dpi.vic.gov.au/weeds](http://www.dpi.vic.gov.au/weeds) and click on 'Weed information notes'.
- Under BushTender you are required to control or eradicate weeds beyond your current obligations as established under legislation or as stated in licence or other agreements already in place.
- Focus management activities on the control or eradication of high threat weeds as specified in your Management Agreement.
- Ensure that grass and herbaceous weed cover does not increase beyond current levels or eliminate (to less than one percent) if specified in the Management Plan.
- Monitor and eliminate any new or emerging weeds.
- Prevent or minimise disturbance to native vegetation.
- Minimise soil disturbance.
- Stagger the removal of weeds (especially woody shrubs such as Boxthorn) that provide habitat for native animals where it is otherwise absent. If possible, plant indigenous (local native) shrubs prior to removing the weeds so that there is no net loss of habitat.
- Aim to control weed populations before seeds are set.
- Apply herbicide during active growth (i.e. avoid periods when plants are drought-stressed).
- Always read the herbicide label prior to use.
- Use an aquatic-friendly herbicide around creek-line areas.

### Health and safety

You are responsible for ensuring all works required in implementing the management actions are conducted in a safe manner and comply with the lawful requirements of any Authority, and with all Acts, regulations and other laws which may be applicable to the Management Plan.

To determine whether there are any underground pipes or cables on your property, you may wish to consider calling 1100 - "Dial before you dig". This is a free referral service from anywhere in Australia.

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## Woody Weeds

Felling/ringbarking	Use on trees and large shrubs that won't resprout (e.g. pines).
Cut and paint with suitable herbicide	Use on trees and shrubs that are likely to resprout from cut stumps. Cut stem and paint cut stump immediately (within 20 seconds) with systemic herbicide.
Drill or frill and fill with suitable herbicide	Use on trees and shrubs that are likely to resprout. Drill a number of holes or make horizontal cuts at an angle of 45° into the sapwood (moist wood below bark) and immediately fill hole with systemic herbicide.

## Grasses / Herbs

Spot-spraying and Wick-wiping	Spot spraying or wiping selected weeds with appropriate herbicide (refer to herbicide label) ensuring that due care is taken to minimise impacts on non-target species (useful for perennial grass/herb control).
Slashing and Mowing	May be used to stop seed set and to allow for easier herbicide application (use only where there is a dense weed infestation and where agreed to by BushTender Field Officer).
Hand weeding	Removing selected plants by hand or chipping (useful where populations are small or where herbicide use is not desirable).
Grazing	Grazing by domestic stock to control the further spread of dense weed infestations. This method is only used when ecologically appropriate and there is no commitment to stock exclusion. Using grazing as a management tool will require that livestock be kept in a holding paddock outside the site for a minimum period of 24 hours prior to entry to reduce the risk of weed introduction and spread.
Spot-burning	Using a hand-held weed burner before seed set (useful for destroying seed heads of annual/perennial herbs), mindful of environmental conditions. Burning will not be recommended if it poses an unacceptable risk.

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
